FIFTY YEARS AGO

Tn 1959, the membership count was 498. The Annual General Meeting was held at the Shire Hall, Llangefni on Saturday, May 30th.

The President, the Marquess of Anglesey was in the chair. Professor J.E. Caerwyn Williams delivered a much welcomed lecture on 'Anglesey's contribution to Welsh Poetry.' On November 21st at the same venue, Lord Boston, the Vice-Chairman was in the chair. Mr Bradley Dixon of Chester addressed the gathering on 'The Wreck of the Royal Charter,' illustrating his lecture with films. Mr. R. Evans, coxwain of the Moelfre lifeboat followed with a vivid description of the rescue of the crew of the S.S. Hindlea which foundered off Moelfre near the spot where the Royal Charter was wrecked. A vote of thanks was proposed by Dr. W. Parry Jones, seconded by Mr. Edwin Price of Chester, a member of the British Sub-aqua Club, the source of the film used in the lecture.

On June 6th 150 members enjoyed brilliant sunshine on an excursion to Plas Newydd and Bryn yr Hen Bobl. Lord Anglesey had made great preparations as all his treasures were displayed in the various rooms. He commented on all the portraits and the Whistler mural. A few members had time to walk to the Bryn yr Hen Bobl burial chamber. Mr. W.J. Hemp who was to have been leader was prevented from coming owing to sudden illness.

July 18th was the day for a visit to Fort Belan, Glynllifon and Fort Williamsberg, by the kind permission of Lord Newborough. Mr. W. Ogwen Williams, M.A. led the party to Fort Belan. It was built in 1761 by Sir Thomas Wynn of Glynllifon, an ancestor of Lord Newborough. Mr. Williams gave a short account of the Glynnies and Wynns of Glynllifon. Members moved on to the park and to Fort Williamsberg, which had been built at the same time as Fort Belan and was connected to 'The Society or Garrison at Fort Williamsberg in Glynllifon Park,' a Whig-Hanoverian club or society established in Caernarfon in 1761 by Sir Thomas Wynn. Both forts were manned for many years by the Royal Caernarvon Grenadiers, a force of 400 men maintained at the expense of Lord Newborough. At Glynllifon a cordial vote of thanks was given to Mr. O. Williams.

On September 12th the glorious summer weather was still present when Canon E. Gilbert Wright, M.A., B.D. gave a detailed and entertaining account of the history of the separate sites of the Lligwy Burial Chamber, Din Lligwy and Capel Lligwy. He invited questions and there was a lively exchange. It emphasized the members' keen interest in ancient buildings and ruins. All of them expressed their gratitude to Canon Wright's leadership for a memorable and pleasant Field day.

TWENTY FIVE YEARS AGO

The Annual General Meeting of 1984 at Holyhead Secondary School was chaired by Mr. Idris Davies. The guest speaker was Dr.

Christopher Smith who gave an illustrated address on 'The Hon W.O. Stanley, Archaeologist.' Mr. Idris Davies presided and a vote of thanks was given by Mrs Frances Llewellyn.

The Autumn meeting was at the Town Hall, Llangefni on 3rd November. Dr. Richard Arnold gave an illustrated address on 'Anglesey's Seabirds and Waterbirds.' Mr. Idris Davies presided and thanks were proposed by Mr. Eric Thomas.

Darlith Goffa Syr Ifor Williams, 10 Tachwedd yn Neuadd y Sir, Llangefni. Dr. Emrys Wyn Jones oedd y darlithydd. Testun y ddarllith oedd, 'O Fôn i Fosworth.' Mr. Idris Davies oedd yn y gadair a chynigiodd Mrs. Helen Ramage ddiolchiadau'r Gymdeithas i'r darlithydd.

The Pot Pourri at Menai Bridge Primary School on 1st March was chaired by Mr. Idris Davies who introduced Mr. Tomos Roberts who gave a short talk on the derivation of place names. Mr. Rhion Pritchard showed slides of old Anglesey and Mr. Siôn Caffell showed pictures of the 1983 excursions.

The Annual Dinner was held at the Trearddur Bay Hotel on 31st March. Mr. W.C. Wynne-Woodhouse was the guest speaker.

Excursions were made to Mold, the U.C.N.W. Archives, Clwyd, Caerau, the Cemlyn Bay Nature Reserve, Merseyside and a weekend at Cambridge. The Holyhead Maritime Museum and the Hywel and Llynon mills were viewed.

Industrial AngleseyStone Science, Friday 17th April

Our chairman, Mr Geraint Evans, invited Gareth Parry to introduce the evening's speaker, Mr Eric Lander, who presented images and discussed some significant parts of Anglesey's industrial past, present and future. His presentation was a much enhanced version of the one given at the Pot Pourri in March 2006. He showed some familiar old photographs as well as modern ones. Eric began with a review of communications on the island which included roads, railways and the sea. Beginning with the roads, pictures of milestones from the old Post Road and Telford's A5 were shown as well as the Mona Inn, the Stanley Embankment and some toll houses. The construction and development of our two main bridges were covered as were the railways to Amlwch, Holyhead and Red Wharf Bay. Marine connections started with the construction, maintenance and development of Holyhead Harbour into a major European ferry port. This was followed by the lighthouses and signal stations around the coast. Sea fishing based at Cemaes, tidal fishing at Ynys Gorad Goch and oyster beds at Rhoscolyn were mentioned, as were Amlwch Port with its dry dock and shipbuilding heritage. The Sea Training Schools on the shores of Menai Straits and Bangor University's modern research ship 'Prince Madog' completed this section. The early use of wind power featured the various mills found on the island. The ruins of Gaerwen's windmill were compared with the restored Melin Llynnon, The Melin Howell water mill and the traces of a tidal mill at Porthaethwy were mentioned. The unusual five sail windmill on Mynydd Parys, used for pumping water from the mine and the Pearl Engine House nearby were shown as were some familiar views of the mine workings, the remains of a once major industry. Quarries on the island included an Anglesey marble site on Holy Island and the limestone quarries at Moelfre and Penmon. Lime kilns associated with smaller quarries shown were one at Lledwigan, Llangefni and the remains of one used during the construction of the suspension bridge. Other mineral workings included the remains of the Berw coalmine, the Porthwen

Môn DdiwydianolGwyddor Carreg, Dydd Gwener 17 Ebrill

Gyda'r Cadeirydd, Mr Geraint Evans, yn y gadair cyflwynodd Gareth Parry siaradwr y noson, Mr Eric Lander, i roi golwg gynhwysfawr o ddiwydiant gorffennol a phresennol Ynys Môn drwy estyniad o'r drowlyniau ddangosodd yn y 'Pot Pourri,' mis Mawrth 2008. Roedd y casgliad yn cynwys rhai lluniau hen ag adnabyddus ynghyd a rhai newydd. Dechreuodd gyda adolygiad o gysylltiadau: y ffyrdd, rheilffyrdd a'r môr. I ddechrau gyda'r ffyrdd, dangoswyd gerrig milltir o'r hen Lôn Bôst a ffordd A5 Telford ac wedyn Tafarn Mona, Cob y Fali a tolltai. Cafwyd hanes adeiladu y ddwy bont dros y Fenai, manylion y tollau ar y bont grôg a dipyn o hanes y rheilffyrdd i Amlwch, Caergybi a Thraeth Coch. Cychwynnodd y cysylltiad a'r môr drwy rhoi sylw i adeiladu, cynnal a datblygu harbwr a morglawdd Caergybi sydd yn awr yn borthladd Ewropiadaid pwysig. Wedyn y goleudai a'r gorsafoedd arwyddo ar

arfodir y gogledd, Porth Amlwch gyda'i ddoc sych a'r cysylltiad gyda'r gwasanaeth peilot. Cyfeiriodd hefyd at bysgota ar y môr o Gemaes, Ynys Gorad Goch yn y Fenai a gwlâu gwystrysennau yn Rhoscolyn ag at yr Ysgolion Hyfforddiant Morwrol ar lannau'r Fenai a llong fodern ymchwil Prifysgol Bangor, y 'Prince Madog.' Mae yma lawer o weddillion melinau gwynt, fel yr un yng Ngaerwen, a mae Melin Llynnon yn dangos sut oedd ynt yn defnyddio nerth y gwynt mewn cyfnodau cynharaf. Mae Melin Howell yn engraffit o felin ddwr a mae gweddillion melin llanw ger Porthaethwy. Cafwyd llun o'r felin unigryw, am fod ganddi bump llafn, ar ben Mynydd Paris i bwmpio dŵr allan o'r mwynghloddiad a'r Tŷ Peiriant Perl cyfagos a golygfeydd cyfarwydd o'r gwithfeydd, gweddillion o ddiwydiant pwysig. I ddangos rhai o chwareli'r ynys gwelsom safle marmor Môn a chwareli calchfaen Moelfre a Phenmon. Odynau yn gysylltiedig a chwareli calch bychan a ddangoswyd oedd un ger Lledwigan, Llangefni a gweddillion un a ddefnyddiwyd wrth adeiladu y bont grog. Gwithfeydd mwynol eraill oedd gweddillion Pwll glo Berw, briweithiau Cemaes a Phorthwen, a gwaith clai china Llanlleiana. Gwithgaredau lleoledig a ddangoswyd oedd y gwaith llechi ysgol yn

and Cemaes brickworks and the china clay works at Llanlleiana. Some local industries were represented by the Pwllfanog school slate factory and the marram weavers of Newborough. Modern industry was illustrated by the Saunders Roe (later Lairds) factory near Beaumaris which, between the 1940's and 1980's produced motor torpedo boats, pleasure boats, buses and modified seaplanes. The RAF station at Valley, Anglesey Aluminium and Wylfa Power Station are examples of major construction and production sites currently providing significant employment on the island. The decline of the farming industry and associated activities has been a major problem. It continues to be an important feature of island life. Caravans and tents have replaced livestock and crops on many fields as the tourist industry continues to expand. Recent developments in that regard have been the coastal path and cruise liners calling at Holyhead. Eric concluded by responding to several searching questions and considered opinions. Gareth thanked him for a well presented and entertaining evening.

Annual General Meeting Friday, 15th May

The Tunnicliffe Room at Oriel Ynys Môn was the venue where our President, Prof. Anthony Carr presided. All the reports were accepted. Our Treasurer stated that the financial situation had deteriorated, in keeping with the recession. He was optimistic that an extra £2,500 should be forthcoming from the raised subscriptions. Savings are a poor yield with interest rates just above zero. There were two welcome donations from the will of Mrs Olive Jones of Caernarfon and from a faithful member, Professor Clark, who is 100 years old. Our meetings secretary stated that attendance is



increasing and plans are afoot for later this year. The next Day School will be in February 2010 and ideas are well advanced. Tributes were given to David Longley for the excellent current Transactions. Election of officers failed to produce a new Excursions secretary- the committee will be pursuing this problem. No new candidates for Secretary and Treasurer were forthcoming either and our present officers agreed to continue for the year ahead. All other officers and committee members were re-elected.

Following a refreshment break our guest speaker, the present secretary of the Royal Commission on the Ancient and Historical Monuments of Wales, Dr Peter Wakelin took the stand. He spoke about the Commission, as last year was its Centenary. Firstly he outlined the history. Following an Act of 1882 the newly formed group in 1907 undertook their first task of an inventory of important 'National monuments' publishing their results in 1912. Twenty one inventories were published to date until the age of databases, listing hundreds of sites. Photographic archives were added-some dating from 1850 and in the 1980s the archaeological branch of the Ordnance Survey merged, bringing a collection of aerial photographs and maps. Currently about 80,000 sites are listed. The public knew little about the Commission but this is being addressed. First he discussed 'Relevance,' the economy being enhanced by the tourist trade, the sites giving a sense of belonging, providing enjoyment and an increase in the quality of life- a pattern to inspire future generations to better custodial care of past artefacts. World heritage sites boost awareness. 'Records' were important. The Commission has 3 million pages of textual description, 1.5 million photographs and 67,000 drawings, including original architectural designs. The task ahead is to digitalise these- 'Re-purposing' so that general access will be easy. That led on to his third theme- 'Research.' Locating important sites is still paramount and sometimes they are identified too late- in an advanced state of demolition! New technologies and sciences are available, dendrochronology is an example. Projects have led to TV programmes and with the aid of the BBC, publications; 'Hidden Treasures, Discovering the Heritage of Wales.' He pointed out that our wonderful historical environment is one of our major assets in Wales. Future plans are to meet the challenge of change; a massive survey of modern sites and uplands. Aerial photography still identifies crop marks and shadows leading to the discovery of 200 new sites every year! The general public, especially the young, can access all this information through web sites, and along e-trails around historical towns. In their turn they can contribute local knowledge. He emphasized how co-operation with CADW and the National Trust is making the task easier. The talk was much appreciated by our members.

Cychwynnodd gyda dipyn o hanes y

Comisiwn a oedd wedi datlu ei ganlynnid yn 2008. Ar ôl deddf yn 1882 daeth grŵp at eu gilydd yn 1907 i grynhau rhestr eiddo o gofadeilion o "Ddiddordeb cenedlaethol" a chyhoeddi y canlyniadau yn 1912. Cyhoeddwyd dauddeg un rhestr, yn cynnwys canoedd o safleoedd, hyd at ddyfodiad y gronfa data. Cafodd archifau ffotograffig, rhai yn ddyddiedig o 1850, eu hychwanegu ag yn 1980 cyfunwyd lluniau a mapiau canang archaeolegol yr *Ordnance Survey*. Mae tua 80,000 o safleoedd ar y rhestr yn bresenol. Dim ond ychydig o wybodaeth am waith y Comisiwn sydd gan y cyhoedd ond mae hyn o dan sylw. Ei destun cyntaf oedd "Perthnasedd," yn cynnwys tyfiant twristiaeth, sicrhau fod y safleoedd yn rhoi teimlad o eiddo a chyflwyno mwynhad, a gwelliant yn ansawdd byw – patrwm i ysbrydoli cenhedlethau dyfodol i wella gofalaeth artefactau. Mae safleoedd "Etifeddiaeth Byd-eang" yn atgyfnerthu ymwybyddiaeth. Yn ail mae "Cofnodion" yn bwysig. Mae gan y Comisiwn 3 miliwn tudalen o ddisgrifiadau ysgrifenedig, miliwn a hanner o ffotograffiau a 67,000 o luniau, yn cynnwys lluniau pensaerniol gwreiddiol. Y pwrras presenol yw trawsnewid yr holl i ffurff digidol i wneud mynediad yn hawdd. Y drydydd thema oedd "Ymchwil." Mae lleoli safleoedd pwysig o'r pwys mwyaf, weithiau mae yn rhy hwyr a'r safle wedi ei chwalu. Mae technoleg a gwyddoniaeth newydd ar gael, mae dendrocronoleg yn siAMPL. Mae rhai projectau wedi arwain i raglenni teledu a, gyda cymorth y BBC, cyhoeddi "Hidden Treasures, Discovering the Heritage of Wales." Trysorion Cuddiedig, Darganfod Etifeddiaeth Cymru. Pwyntiodd allan mae un o aseda mwyaf Cymru yw'r amgylched hanesyddol rhyfeddol. Cynllun y dyfodol yw cyfarfod yr her o newid gydag arolwg enfawr o safleoedd modern a'r uwchdir oedd. Mae awyrlunio yn dal i ddarganfod marciau enudau a cysgodion, yn arwain i 200 o safleoedd newydd bob blwyddyn. Medr y cyhoedd, yn enwedig yr ifanc, gael mynediad i'r holl wybodaeth drwy safleoedd ar y wé ag ar hyd lwybrau o amgylch trefi hanesyddol. Yn eu tro byddant yn cyfrannu i wybodaeth lleol. Gorffennodd drwy ganolbwytio fod cyd-weithio gyda CADW a'r Ymddiriedolaeth Genedlaethol yn gwneud y dasg yn haws.

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School Log Snippets

British School, Llangefni.

1865 Sept 30th. The children assembled in school (160) at 12.30 pm and at 12.45 started in procession towards the Station, headed by the Llangefni Brass band and accompanied by the Ladies and Gentlemen of the Committee. The train having arrived in Gaerwen the procession was formed again and proceeded through Gaerwen and hence to a field close to Station where all were supplied with bunloaf & c. Having done ample justice to the dainties laid before them and enjoying themselves with different sports all returned home and proceeded to the Square where after returning hearty thanks to Mr Dews for his kindness and liberality in getting the train, to the ladies for their preparation for the occasion and singing the N. Anthem they broke up, every one returning home, tired enough but much pleased with the day's excursion and entertainments.

Beaumaris Board School.

1883. Nov. 19th. Mr Miller visited the School Monday afternoon. Half holiday given on Wednesday to the Steeple Chase. Had the children in at 1 on Thursday and dismissed at 3 for the Hunt procession.

The first excursion of the season took place on a glorious May evening when Mrs Ann Benwell welcomed a large gathering at the RSPB car park at RAF Valley. Mr Roger Foreman led us all on to the common and on a rocky promontory he gave a short account of Tywyn Trewan and the interesting story of the common. The attempt to fence it off as private ground in the late nineteenth century was followed by court cases quoting certain mysterious ruins (Murddun Eglwys) proving the public claim. This area is now out of bounds within the MOD restricted zone. The onset of World War II saw the commandeering of most of the common, to create an important RAF station. He showed us several lakes and spoke of medieval references to them. The main one was Llyn Penrhyn to the east. The presence of a church at Llanfihangel yn Nhowyn was discussed with the help of Frances Llewellyn. The walk continued over the common and past the south of Llyn Dinam, then onto the road, over the railway bridge and down to the edge of Llyn Cerrig Bach. The Society's plaque was inspected and on the lake edge Mrs Eflyn Owen Jones gave an account of how in the 1940s her father found the artefacts during the dredging of peat to stabilise the ground and create the runways for the airfield. The exact spot is still debatable and could have been within the MOD ground on the other side of the road. Through the rushes another smaller lake or 'Pwll' was indicated alongside Llyn Cerrig Bach, with a ridge of higher rocky outcrop ground between, possibly used by our Iron Age ancestors to hurl votive offerings into the water on either side. Mrs Frances Llewellyn then gave a colourful description of the artefacts. Their source was discussed. Certain items such as the fragments of the cauldron and a trumpet probably originated in Ireland. The famous slave chain had all the signs of originating in the South East, from the Belgae tribes. The beautiful scrolled decorated pieces for the chariot and the shield boss were like no others from other Celtic sites and Frances is certain that they were manufactured locally. Eflyn then showed a replica of the slave chain to an appreciative audience, well satisfied and exercised after an enjoyable evening.



We gathered on the farmyard of Mynachdy to be introduced by Ann Benwell to Mrs Wena Roberts. On this occasion, it was a beautiful sunny day. Mynachdy has a long and colourful history. It was once the property of Colonel John Robinson, a royalist commander in the defence of Anglesey against the Roundheads, allegedly making his escape from Mynachdy to the Isle of Man after surrendering at Aber Lleiniog. Mynachdy has another intriguing tale to tell; a smugglers' tunnel from the seashore to a door inside the house. A door does exist and opens to stone steps leading down, but whether they eventually lead you to a sealed cave is an interesting question. The house was also the boyhood home of Evan Thomas, the shipwrecked child who was the founder of the dynasty of the *Teulu Myddygon Esgyrn*, the bonesetters of Anglesey.

After a picnic lunch on the cliffs above the sea Dr. David Jenkins escorted us along the cliffs and informed us about the geology and the attempt to mine for copper. There was no roof and no warm shelter at the hearth of an old dwelling at Ysgubor Gader, but the large lintel for the chimney breast had interesting geology to the keen eyes of Dr. Jenkins. Eventually we arrived at the top of Penbryn yr Eglwys, where Frances Llewellyn explained the possibility of the remains of a small Church or Cell from the middle ages. After an evening meal at the Lobster Pot, we all made our way home sun-tanned from the days excursion and well pleased with a perfect day. Grateful thanks were extended to the organisers and guides, and Mrs Wena Roberts for her kindness and patience in answering our many questions.

On our evening walk in June to Castell Aberlleiniog all 21 of us met in pouring rain at the Lleiniog Car Park to be greeted by Ann Benwell, who introduced us to our guide Mr Neil Johnstone. Aberlleiniog, a motte and bailey castle was built around 1088 by Hugh D'Avranches the Norman Earl of Chester. Neil from Menter Môn explained to us the amount of work that had to be carried out over the past few years on the Castle itself and the approach to the Castle, since its purchase in 2003 by Menter Môn. He described the castle from the battlements, showing us one of the towers that had been converted into a lookout by the Home Guard of World War II. Despite the rain it was an excellent evening and undoubtedly worth another visit.

Although the weather forecast for Saturday 11th was dire, 18 of us ventured out to Pwllheli by 11am to be greeted by hordes of scantily clad teenagers milling around the station square; it was Wakestock weekend at Penrhos, where over 30,000 gathered for a water sport and youthful musical extravaganza. We eventually found one another and formed our small group which must have seemed somewhat eccentric to the on-looking teenagers, hopefully they will replicate our example 60 years hence! Ann Benwell greeted us all and laid down rules for the day. Andrew Davidson informed us of the history of Pwllheli and proceeded to guide us around the old borough. We were cordially invited to view the interior of Penmount Chapel. It was built in 1841 on a previous site of 1801 and the first site of the early Methodist Chapel of 1781. In a private back garden behind the Chapel was a tin hut, possibly the site of the original Mwnt. We also viewed the 17th century tavern, Penlan Fawr. The rain went somewhere else, and time also vanished: suddenly it was 12.30, time for lunch.

At 2 pm prompt, we all gathered outside the Nanhoron Arms Hotel at Nefyn. Rob Evans took charge of us and guided us expertly around the tranquil streets of the borough showing us its rich history. At Tŵr Nefyn, Rob explained to members that from the top of the Tŵr, the layout of Y Maes, the site of Llys, the Maesdref settlement, the borough and priory lands can be viewed. This stone tower, built on a medieval motte in 1846, served as a look out for the herring fishing industry. Ty Halen on Stryd Y Fron, adjacent to Stryd y Plas, may have been a salting house for the herring catch in Nefyn Bay. We were able to see inside a pair of eighteenth century semi-detached cottages, Mursefer and Tŷ Receiver on Stryd y Ffynnon. They were built by the Nanhoron estate on an earlier dwelling once owned by Humphrey Jones, Charles I's Receiver General of Revenues for North Wales. We were grateful to Margaret Dunn for arranging at short notice, our private visit with the present owners Mr & Mrs Ronald Bond. It was an excellent day out for all of us. We owe a debt of gratitude to Ann

These are a good source for house history (of houses larger than cottages). These name the property and usually the owner and occupier. It is best to work backwards through these as the house may have been built during this period.
